#### **Around New Mexico**

Eddy County was organized on February 25, 1889 from land that was part of Lincoln County. Current population is about 59,000 and the county covers 4,198 square miles. The county is named for Charles B. Eddy, a rancher and promoter who was part of a group that built the Pecos Irrigation and Improvement Project. This county has a rich history. As early as the 1860's moving cattle through this area began. Charles Goodnight and Oliver Loving were moving large herds of cattle along the Pecos River. The business involved driving cattle from Texas to sell to military forts and locals along a route from Pecos Texas to Fort Stanton, Fort Sumner, Las Vegas, over Raton Pass, through Trinidad on to Denver and finally to Cheyenne Wyoming. Cheyenne was a shipping point east and west via railroad. Goodnight & Loving made several drives along this route. When Oliver Loving died in 1868, John Chisum joined with Charles Goodnight and at some point it was estimated that over 100,000 head of cattle had moved through the area. The Eddy brothers, John & Charles, arrived in the early 1880's. Charles Eddy had ideas to develop the area. Eddy convinced several investors that the project would work. These investors included Amos Bissell (Denver banker), Robert Tansill, (maker of the Punch 5¢ cigar), Charles Greene (St. Louis newspaperman), James John Hagerman (wealth mine owner), and Pat Garrett (former Lincoln County Sheriff). Many canals and water works projects diverted water to farms & ranches in the valley. The Eddy brothers also incorporated a company to run a railroad from Pecos, TX to the town of Eddy (now Carlsbad). The rail line eventually was extended to Roswell.

Carlsbad, originally known as Seven Rivers then as Eddy, was established in 1888. The settlement started as the cattle drives began to follow the Pecos River in the 1860's. Carlsbad is the county seat and the largest town in the county. The irrigation projects were centered in the Carlsbad area. A movement was begun to change the name of the town to Carlsbad because of disenchantment with the Eddy brothers and the discovery that the spring water in the area rivaled the spring water in Karlsbad, Bohemia, a popular spa in Europe at that time. The election, held in 1899, and the named was changed. The official proclamation was not made until March 18, 1918 by Governor W.E. Lindsey. Loving, 10 miles south of Carlsbad, was first called Vaud by the Swiss who settled there in 1893. The Swiss brought Italian labor to work the farms. In 1894 the name was changed to Florence. Then in 1908 the name was changed to Loving to honor John Loving, one of the first people to drive cattle up the Pecos River Valley. Malaga, 15 miles SE of Carlsbad, a farming community. First settled in 1883 and was called Lookout. The name changed in 1892 to Malaga, a sweet Spanish wine made from grapes grown in the area. Swiss settlers set up 5 acre lots and grew grapes using Italian labor that the Swiss brought in. The land became impoverished and disease destroyed the vines in the early 1900's.

Hope, a small settlement 21 miles west of Artesia, was first called Badgerville, from 1884-1888, because the people lived in dugouts like badgers. Permanent settlers came in 1888-89 when the first post office was established. The story behind the name is 2 settlers named Elder Miller and Joe Richards threw a dime in the air and shot at it. Richards said "I hope you lose". Miller lost and Joe Richards picked the name Hope. A railroad line was proposed and construction was started in 1906. The funding to finish the line was coming from an English capitalist, but he was unfortunately on the Titanic. The unfinished rail bed is still visible in some areas. Artesia, 36 miles north of Carlsbad, was first settled by a Union soldier, J.F. Truitt. Farming and ranching grew in this small area along the Pecos River. In 1894 the Old Stage Line started a regular line to the town, which was called South Chisum Camp. Later when the railroad came through, the named changed to Miller. A post office was started in 1899 using the name Stegman, after a promoter by that name who married Mrs. Sallie Robert, a niece of John Chisum. For some time the location was known as Miller-Stegman. In 1903 the actual townsite was laid out on land bought from Mrs. Robert. She had called this land Artesia because of the Artesian water wells on the land. The name Artesia stuck and the US Postal Service formally adopted the name. In 1923 the first oil was discovered and the town has been an oil town ever since. Some town that didn't survive include **Dayton**, named for J.C. Day in 1902. Had a post office until 1944. Globe, 12 miles W. of Carlsbad named after the Globe Mills & Mining Co. had a PO from 1925-43. Queen, 40 miles SE of Carlsbad was named for the Queen Brothers Ranch which agrees to supply water to the town. PO from 1905-20. Otis was a small farming area south of Carlsbad that had a PO from 1893-1901. Also near Carlsbad was Westwater, PO from 1902-03, a place called Swamp, PO from 1894-95.
