







Elks 1984 Rose Parade Float



# NUCLEAR ENERGY Are we being left behind?



Twenty-five countries now produce nuclear-generated electricity. Ten more plan to do so by the end of the decade. The international growth of this energy source raises questions about what, if anything, America stands to lose if we fall behind in nuclear energy development.

America helped pioneer the technology of the world's nuclear plants. Nuclear-generated electricity in the U.S. grew to a record 283 billion kilowatt-hours last year—close to 13 percent of the nation's total electricity production. Eighty-four plants are now licensed to operate across the country, and 56 more are being built. In terms of total nuclear electric generating capacity, America remains number one.

But since 1978, we have under-

gone a time of national hesitation. For five years now, no new nuclear power plants have been ordered in the U.S. During the same period, there have been orders for at least 40 such plants in other parts of the world, even with the global economic slump.

# The international rise of nuclear electricity

France, the Soviet Union, and Japan are among the many countries committed to nuclear electricity as an economic, secure alternative to oil-fired and coal-fired power.

By 1985, over half of France's electricity will be nuclear-generated. The cost of producing a nuclear kilowatthour in France is 25 percent cheaper than with coal and 55 percent cheaper than with oil. It takes only six years or so to get a nuclear plant built there.


Belgium, Finland, France, Japan, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, the United Kingdom, and West Germany all generate a greater share of their electricity from nuclear power plants than the U.S.

# Japan's ambitious nuclear construction program

When the 1973 oil embargo struck, over 80 percent of Japan's oil was coming from the Middle East. To reduce such vulnerability, Japan decided to accelerate its nuclear power program.

Japan now operates 25 nuclear units, and expects to double its nuclear capacity by 1990. Japanese companies are busy designing their own advanced reactors, and thus gaining the edge in nuclear energy technology.

And despite Japan's recent economic slowdown, there have been no cancellations of nuclear plants under construction there.




Japan now has a larger percentage of nuclearelectricity production capacity (as a share of total electricity production capacity) than does the U.S. And Japan's nuclear capacity is expected to grow rapidly.

# A secure America needs a balanced mix of energy sources

This country has a lot more oil, natural gas, and coal than either France or Japan. But oil supplies are uncertain. Natural gas is more valuable for other uses than for burning in power plants. And coal, though essential, can't be expected to do the job alone.

Some of the renewable energy options are promising, but they're



In many countries throughout the world, nuclear power is now supplying a substantial share of the electricity that people consume. still drops in the national energy bucket.


What is best for the practical generation of large amounts of electricity? The National Academy of Sciences has stated that "Coal and nuclear power are the only economic alternatives for large-scale application in the remainder of this century."

# Highest safety standards and a U.S. plan for nuclear waste

The accident at Three Mile Island prompted reforms in safety, nuclear regulation, and plant operations. Since that time, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the utility industry itself have made nuclear energy the most carefully controlled technology in the country. It has one of the best safety records of any major industrial enterprise.

In 1979, U.S. nuclear electric utilities founded the Institute of Nuclear Power Operations. Based in Atlanta, INPO focuses on the human factor of nuclear plant safety. The Institute monitors plants in operation and under construction, and accredits operator training programs to assure that the highest standards are met.

Besides plant safety, another big concern has been nuclear waste. An important step toward solving the

waste problem is the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982, signed into law early this year. The Act defines a timetable and Federal responsibility for the safe and permanent disposal of high-level waste, in deep geologic formations that have been stable for millions of years. In 1987, the President is to recommend to Congress the first U.S. disposal site.

The geologic disposal method has been judged the safest by many governments and scientific bodies. They agree that repositories deep underground can isolate the waste permanently. West Germany is now drilling to test the suitability of the salt formation at Gorleben. Canada's research and development is focusing on the ancient rock formations of the Canadian Shield plateau. And Switzerland favors disposal in rock far beneath the northern part of the Swiss lowlands.

# The cost of not pushing ahead

Nuclear-generated electricity is a secure, dependable, economic energy source for millions of people in many different countries. And they plan to use more of it in the years to come.

As its use grows, nuclear electricity will help these countries strengthen their position in increasingly competitive world markets. They realize that a healthy national economy needs a healthy supply of energy.

Will we have to play a costly game of catch-up in the competition ahead? America runs the risk of doing just that—if we ignore the growing international reliance on nuclear energy, and the reasons behind that growth.

# **HEALTH INSURANCE AFTER 65**

Health insurance is absolutely vital once you reach age 65. You may be a spry 68-year-old, but the chances are that you will face extensive medical bills in the years ahead. How will you pay those bills?

Medicare is the first line of defense. But, if you read the papers, you know that Medicare is in trouble, facing the same insolvency problems that have threatened the Social Security system as a whole. Social Security retirement benefits have now been rescued, as described in last month's column, and attention has to be paid to Medicare. It has to be paid soon, or the Medicare hospital insurance trust fund could be out of money by 1990. More important, in the view of many observers, attention has to be paid to the entire American system of health care delivery. Medicare can't be addressed in isolation, says the American Association of Retired Persons, or no solution will be permanent in the face of the ever-rising costs of quality health care.

For now, you can expect your Medicare benefits to continue, although you can also expect to shoulder an everincreasing share of the costs. The Reagan Administration proposals that would have passed extensive costs on to you in the current year have been (at least temporarily) defeated and it is the providers of health care services who now have to pay more. But it's reasonable to expect that some form of increased cost-sharing for beneficiaries will creep into the system.

Meanwhile, Medicare is reducing overall costs in a number of ways: Reimbursement rates for hospitals are now set in advance, based on "diagnosis-related groups," instead of on actual expenditures. This won't affect you—except to the extent that hospital costs are passed on to private insurers, thereby inflating the overall cost of health care. More directly, Medicare is now the "secondary payer," paying benefits only after primary benefits are paid by your automobile medical, no-fault, or liability insurance policy. In addition, if you're between 65 and 70 and still

employed, your primary health insurance coverage may now be provided by your employer.

If you are still employed, therefore, you have to make a decision. Here's what the new regulations provide:

• If your employer has at least 20 employees, then all employees between the ages of 65 and 70 must be offered the same health care coverage as younger employees.

If dependents of younger employees are covered, then dependents of employees between 65 and 70 must also be offered coverage. You do not, however, have to include your spouse under the employer plan.

 You must be offered the same range of options as is offered to younger employees, on the same terms, and at the same cost (if any). You cannot be charged more because you are older.

 Your employer must give you a full description of the company plan, at least 30 days before you become eligible for Medicare, and you must be given the opportunity to elect either Medicare or your employer's health plan as your primary coverage. You may, however, be able to change your mind at a later date.

• If you select the employer's plan, then Medicare will provide secondary benefits, picking up at least some of the copayments and deductibles in the employer plan. If you select Medicare, however you may not use your employer's plan for secondary coverage.

plan for secondary coverage.

On the surface, after looking at this last item, you would appear to be better off selecting your employer's plan. For most people, this is probably true. But there are other factors to consider before you make up your mind:

 Does your employer's plan require contributions from you? If so, how much are those contributions, and how do they compare to the out-of-pocket costs you might face under Medicare?

 If you will want Medicare coverage later on, as you certainly might, are you aware that, under present law, it will cost you more? For each year that you delay enrollment in Medicare Part B (medical coverage), premiums go up by 10 per-

cent. If you wait until age 70, therefore, your premiums will be 50 percent more, for the rest of your life, than they would have been if you started at age 65.

 Even more important than the financial penalty, according to Judy Mazo, Vice President and Director of Research at Martin E. Segal Company, pension consultants, is the waiting period you will face. Medicare regulations currently provide that if you fail to enroll during your initial eligibility period, the three months before your 65th birthday and the four months after, your next opportunity to enroll is on the following January 1 (enrollment runs from January through March), with coverage effective July 1. This means a waiting period for Medicare coverage that could be as long as fifteen months. That's a long time to be without health insurance, especially when you're in the vulnerable post-65 years.

What, therefore, should you do when faced with the choice between Medicare and employer coverage? Judy Mazo suggests that the choice is clear-cut:


1. If your employer plan is non-contributory, with no financial outlay on your part, do not under any circumstances turn it down. Even if it's not the best plan in the world, Medicare will pick up secondary benefits so there's no way you can be worse off if you have it. If your cost-free employer plan pays a single nickel, says Ms. Mazo, that's one nickel less that you'll have to pay toward the Medicare deductible.

2. You should also, no matter what, keep up Medicare Part B coverage (Part A, hospital coverage, is free, although you do have to apply; Part B requires that you enroll and pay a monthly premium) so that you don't face the financial and waiting period penalties described above. In this age group, you don't want to be without major medical coverage for even a brief time and Medicare Part B will provide protection if you change jobs, lose your job, or retire.

Note: Legislation has been introduced in Congress which would eliminate both the financial and the waiting period penalty. If this legislation passes, you'll have to compare coverage under Medicare Part B and under your employer's plan—which may have a higher deductible—and decide whether it's worthwhile to pay the premiums for Medicare.

3. If your employer plan is contributory, requiring that you pay premiums, you should still have Medicare plus some supplemental coverage. The question then becomes: Can you afford your employer's plan as well as Medicare? Or do you have another choice? If you have coverage through your spouse's group insurance, for example, you may want to drop your own employer's plan and keep Medicare. Or it may be cheaper to buy a Medicare supplemental policy from a


 Your September issue featured a charming article on the C.C.C. of 50 years ago, but in the words of an oldtime radio show, "Wuz you there, Charlie?"

Myself and several dozen others were brought by train to Fort Lewis, near Tacoma, during the early days of the Corps. There we lived, eight men to each old U.S. Army pyramidstyle tent with duck-board floors, through the torrential Washington spring rains. Pre-fab housing was nowhere in sight.

As to an acceptance physical, if you were warm and breathing, you got accepted! I guess the more elaborate physicals came later.

As for doing calesthenics and then marching off to fell timber by axe and saw (we didn't have chainsaws in those days) well, the physical activity of the

# SECRETARIAL SHORTAGE CONTINUES

Peter C. braced himself, took several deep breaths and then entered his already crowded reception room. His telephone, said the building switchboard operator, had been ringing incessantly since she came on duty. The watchman had let people in the outer office because the hall was too congested. And nobody had picked up his morning mail.

He had been without a secretary for nearly a month and, although a temporary replacement filled in for a few days and his help wanted ad was appearing in the newspaper daily, he was falling behind in his own work and making little progress finding a new secretary. He had interviewed dozens of candidates and his optimism was waning.

Peter's not alone, of course. From corner stores to law offices...from medical clinics to colleges, vacancies outnumber the experienced secretaries available.

Furthermore, business education officials worry that Peter's temporary headache may become a crisis in the mid to late 1980s.

It may take more money, more challenging opportunities and a better image to attract and keep competent secretaries in the years ahead. The shortage has become critical as I mentioned in my column several years ago.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that while the number of secretaries will remain approximately the same by 1990—4 million plus—the number of jobs to be filled will jump by 37 percent. The U.S. Labor Department, for example, listed secretaries as the most-wanted occupation of nearly 73,000 available jobs in a survey last September.

The salary? The 1982 starting pay was somewhere between \$7,600 and nearly \$14,000, the government agency reported.

"We're fighting to overcome the flowers-and-candy image of secretaries as little girls or office wives," Candy Louis of Professional Secretaries International told *USA Today* recently. "You know, the idea that secretaries are a service but not members of a management team—cute but incompetent."

Said a woman executive familiar with the dilemma: "People think that anyone

smart enough to be a good secretary wouldn't want to be a secretary. Let's face it...if the image were different, the pay would reflect it."

That's what another government survey discovered a year or so ago. An examination of occupations with the most openings showed that secretarial, clerical and bookkeeping offer the most opportunities to high school graduates without any experience. They are also the lowest paying positions, the survey revealed.

Smaller businesses, where most of these jobs are generated, can expect to see the situation get worse before it gets better as larger companies continually vie for a smaller pool of experienced and trained personnel. "Salaries are going to have to be more competitive and the image improved or smaller firms will have real difficulties staffing their offices," said a New York education specialist.

The problem, of course, is that executives and proprietors of small businesses—those that have less than \$300,000 in annual sales—aren't earning large salaries either. According to a USA Today graph supplied by the Comprehensive Accounting Corp., 54 percent of the smaller companies are paying their CEOs less than \$31,000 a year.

However, business owners or company managers cannot afford to run an office with untrained people at a time when office productivity has improved, costly technology is being installed and customers, employees and management itself depend upon the efficient processing of the paperwork.

Says John L. Crossley, dean of the Utica School of Commerce of New York, "We are going to need more trained persons in different areas of the office than before. There are already needs for word and data processing personnel." His school recently instituted the first county-wide program in data processing and also introduced a computer technician major.

Crossley believes that schools and businesses have been diligent about maintaining standards at a time when modern office equipment has changed the workplace and there is pressure from students and employers to get peo-

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

ple through training programs faster. "Shorthand appears to be like a foreign language to many students," he says. "It's one of our tougher courses. Students have to have it, however. It's one of the subjects employers look for, we find, when they decide to hire."

Proprietors can cope with personnel problems if they use sensible guidelines in recruitment and retention of employees. "Such policies may take time to devise but in the long run, they cut down continual turnover and create a better environment for attracting good people. Some firms and their owners are notorious for demands on secretarial employees that go far beyond the scope of the job and salary and, as a result, they are continually looking for new people," said a counselor to management.

One of the most important ways to improve the position is to make sure that there is a job description. Ads seeking "Gal Fridays" or thinly disguised "gofers" will turn off the experienced secretary. The job description helps give the secretary duties she feels trained to do.

Obviously, there are salary differences between corporations and small firms. Yet, too many times, small business owners forget the advantages that may keep a secretary from accepting higher paying positions. The smaller firm can offer better working conditions, less pressure and better hours, increased vacation time, flexibility in vacations and other personal benefits that larger organizations won't provide.

Don't give the new secretary too much work too fast. It's one of the problems that younger, inexperienced secretaries encounter in small businesses. "I walked in, the employer showed me where the files were, gave me the key to the place and told me to handle what came up and left. Two days later, he was back wondering why I hadn't finished the correspondence on his desk and gotten the billing out for the month," one disgruntled secretary told me.

Above all, don't lower your standards to merely fill the position because of a person's attractive personality or acceptance of less money. "Don't lose sight of necessary standards and needs and give in to expedience," says Nancy Roberts, executive director of New York's Industry, Labor and Education Council of the Mohawk Valley. Among the principal reasons a number of secretarial and clerical applicants are turned down and will continue to be rejected, say corporate personnel directors, is that they lack skills-shorthand and minimum typing speed with accuracy-and if deficiencies are noted by corporate employers, such problems could be worse in smaller businesses where there is an urgent need for versatile workers.

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

# Addresses The Elks **Grand Lodge Session**

Hello, or I should say, "aloha," to all of you at the Elks Convention in Honolulu. And my husband sends his regards as well. I wish I could be there to thank you personally for teaming with Action in the struggle against drug abuse. I can't think of any more welcome an ally than 1.6 million Elks.

For too long, we didn't understand enough about the frightening realities of drug abuse, and the damaging impact it could have on our families and our society. For too long, many of our young people tangled in the web of drugs were justified in asking, "Who really cares?"

Fortunately, because of people such as yourselves, that attitude is changing. When our oldest and largest fraternal organization stands up as one and shouts, "We care," the message will certainly be heard, and it will be heard in communities all across the country.

What you're doing comes as no surprise to any of us who know that the Elks' motto is "Elks Care." But I was very interested to learn how you became interested in the drug problem. Appearing with Mrs. Reagan will be Rita Moreno, Bill Bixby, Michael Landon, Bruce Weitz of "Hill Street Blues," Franco Harris of the Pittsburgh Steelers and many other

Produced through the cooperation of PBS and WQED/ Pittsburgh, "The Chemical People" will, in its first hour on November 2, 1983, examine the emotional and sociological aspects of the chemical epidemic and will place special emphasis on the widespread denial of the problem. Substances will be shown and their effects will be discussed.

The second hour of "The Chemical People," to be aired November 9, 1983, will offer hope and guidance as communities are informed on how to form permanent task forces to prevent and combat substance abuse. Experienced community resource experts will detail model programs of information dissemination, prevention, intervention and treatment.

Underlining the vital importance of "The Chemical People's" message, Mrs. Reagan points out, "I think that we are in danger of losing a whole generation of young people. # Small Town Elks Tackle The "Big City" Problem

Too many of us have had the attitude that drug abuse is just a "big city" problem. But, this is beginning to change. In our July/August issue we learned that mayors across the nation, in cities large and small, felt that drug abuse was one of their most pressing problems. In the foregoing pages we have seen that the problem has caused a nationwide awakening of concern and that GER Kenneth V. Cantoli, on accepting office, has proclaimed the support of the Order in aiding any agency, state, local, or federal, in combating the slow, drugrelated erosion of our youth.

And now, from our Brothers in Riverton, Wyoming, we can see the germination of one such program and understand how small town concern and energy can help lick the "big city" problem. Begun five years ago, this program of education has generated the full support of the Wyoming Elks.


The Riverton Lodge became involved in the Drug Awareness Program by providing facilities to the Riverton Police Department for evening meetings and seminars to educate the students and parents of the community on drugs and their harmful effects in an environment free from the somber harshness of the courtroom or police station.

This involvement has grown to include the purchase of displays and hand-out literature stressing the importance of not getting involved with drugs. The investigative and counseling portions of the program are left strictly to the professionals—the police and other concerned agencies.

Now the program is spreading statewide with Wyoming Elks raising funds for literature, slide/cassette programs and educational films in their own communities. Lodges are opening their facilities and hosting open-house meetings and panel discussions while also providing funds to publicize the program.

These meetings and panel discussions stress the identification, recognition and elimination of drugs, drug-paraphernalia and other abused substances including alcohol. Local law enforcement, the judiciary, school administrators, students, parents and any other interested parties are drawn together to examine, discuss and educate themselves on this most pressing of problems. Graphic displays show the harmful effects of alcoholism, marijuana use and other forms of drug abuse. Penitentiary inmates discuss the aspects of drug-related crime in the most basic of layman's terminology. The program stresses a no-nonsense look at the human misery concealed behind the "glamour" of the drug scene.

The Wyoming Elks, especially the pioneering Riverton Lodge, have set an enviable example for the rest of Elkdom to follow. Their keen sense of community service, their open-handed generosity and their involvement at the neighborhood level exemplify the spirit that makes "Charity...the Cornerstone of Elkdom."

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

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
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Your Money Back



For the readers of Elks Magazine we're tabulating ballots gathered during our latest survey of Manhattan's friendliest small hotels. The sleuthing involved nearly a week of peering into bedrooms, bars and bathrooms, all the way from Lower Manhattan to the upper 80s. When we'd finished, the results were strikingly similar to those noted in an earlier report some years ago. Without argument, the front-runner remains the charming little Wyndham (42 West 58th St., New York 10019) just across the street from the fashionable Plaza Hotel.

Namely, it remains a delightful, intimate and unassuming little hotel with the freshly scrubbed look of an inn in the Cotswolds or an auberge outside Paris. Why else does it remain our favorite Manhattan hotel? For various reasons: location, price (one of New York's more reasonable hotels),

atmosphere. But in particular there is an air of genuine friendliness as well as devotion to duty by a staff that truly cares.

This sense of well-being envelops the newly arrived guest the instant the front door opens and one is ushered into the tastefully furnished small lobby with its array of comfortable sofas and chairs. Granted, there are non-dial telephones in the rooms, but who cares? The switchboard operator is cheerful, so it's almost like having a private secretary at one's bidding. In addition, there are non-automated elevators. So instead of pushing buttons, one is greeted by smiling Mohammed Khan who bows politely and inquires, "What floor, please?" Only once does he ask; after the initial greeting Mohammed remembers. Faces and numbers stick in his mind, no matter whether it's Peter Falk, Ginger Rogers, Ben Gazzara, John Cassavetes, Hume Cronyn or unfamiliar figures that just happen in out of the night.

Besides running an elevator, Mohammed looks after other wants of the Wyndham's guests. Last spring he delivered breakfast and morning newspapers daily to a famous actress who could have afforded the Plaza across the street but chose the Wyndham instead. Singles at the Wyndham start at around \$70, doubles at \$85 and suites can be had for as little as \$130. When he quotes rates over the telephone, owner John Mados frequently is asked by a startled caller: "Is that with or without bath?" It is with bath always, of course, for the Wyndham is first-rate from the ground up. Equally reasonable is the restaurant where eggs Benedict can be had for \$3.75. Or just around the corner, on Avenue of the Americas, there is the tidy little New Chambers restaurant with its checkered tablecloths and bacon-and-eggs breakfasts for only \$3.25 (next door there's a deli that turns out sandwiches at near pre-inflation prices).

Mados, with his wife, Suzanne, acquired the Wyndham in the mid-'60s, transforming it into a snug shelter for Broadway stars, business executives, tourists and familiar figures from

Hollywood's celluloid world. Regulars describe returning to the Wyndham as "like coming home." And it is. The Wyndham simply doesn't operate like a computerized hotel. Mail inquiries are answered personally by John and Suzanne Mados. And because this charming couple goes out of their way to be hospitable, guests return again and again. Comedian-director Charles Nelson Reilly recently sent John and Suzanne a bouquet of flowers with a note reading: "I miss you." They get postcards, letters. Even occasional gifts from regulars. The Wyndham: a miracle in Manhattan.

Like the Wyndham, the Algonquin (59 West 44th St., New York 10036) appeals to Broadway stars who find solace in the oak-paneled lounge and dining room. Its fame was born originally of its Round Table and the celebrities who gathered at noontime: Alexander Woollcott, Franklin P. Adams, Dorothy Parker, James Thurber, Robert Benchley, George S. Kaufman and a host of others. Fresh flowers grace coffee tables in the lounge and a grandfather clock ticks away the hour, so there is more the atmosphere of one's own living room at teatime or the cocktail hour than that of a hotel lobby.

To be sure, the Algonquin is more than a small hotel; its lounge is the social gathering place for actors and actresses as well as the curious who sink deeply into its sofas to observe the Manhattan merry-go-round while sipping a Campari and soda or a hefty draught of Scotch. Granted, rooms at the Algonquin are small (rates on a par with the Wyndham's), but few fault the service. The Algonquin is simply a very civilized place where traditions refuse to die. Teatime in the Oak Room is an hour when guests ring librarian bells to summon waiters during a babble of voices.


Andrew Anspach, the managing director, insists that the Algonquin possesses all the enduring qualities of a fine old inn. Yes, including a cat named Hamlet, although the original Hamlet died some time ago. No ordinary cat, Hamlet was given a proper send-off both by newspapers and wire services. The Associated Press dispatched a 200-word bulletin; Variety carried Hamlet's obit. Now there is Hamlet II, curled up in the departed Hamlet's spot on a stack of magazines at the newsstand, purring, evidently happy with its new home.

Location prevented the 180-room American Stanhope Hotel (995 Fifth Ave., New York 10028) from placing first in our survey of Manhattan's hotels. On the other hand, its position far uptown could be a plus for those who tire of the midtown action (besides, there's free limousine service from the door). On Fifth Avenue at 81st Street, the Stanhope faces the imposing Metropolitan Museum of Art with Sunday afternoon concerts at its doorstep. A mini-museum itself, the hotel claims the largest 19th-Century American antique collection

in the nation. A sizable fortune was spent refurbishing public and guest rooms under the scrutinizing eye of owner Mimi Russell, daughter of Lady Sarah Spencer-Churchill and ex-magazine publisher Edwin Russell.

In her search across America, this proprietress with an eye for artful treasures came up with dozens of Empire and Victorian pieces that place the American Stanhope in a league by itself. Along with priceless furnishings, rooms are graced with paintings that frequently are on loan to various

Benjamin Franklin said, "Time is money." But, with all due respect to Mr. Franklin, time is not money. Time cannot be hoarded. It must be spent this day, this hour, this moment. It can neither be borrowed nor lent. And no one is richer than anyone else in time. Longevity notwithstanding, time is apportioned equally to all of us. Every day of our lives, each one of us is given twenty-four hours to do with what we will.

If we squander our money, there is a chance of getting more. When we squander our time, it is lost forever.

There is a difference between spending time and squandering it. You don't have to keep on the run to spend time wisely. Time spent in thought, meditation, even daydreaming can be highly productive. But time frittered away watching a TV show you don't even like is not.

Bernard Baruch once said, "The man who can master his time can master nearly everything." If you have trouble managing your time—and most of us do—here are ten suggestions to help you become more time efficient.

1. Do it now. I am particularly irked by the quantity of "junk" mail I receive almost every day. However, if I immediately spend the few minutes it takes to sort and dispose of it, I use far less time than if I let it accumulate on my desk where I must move it around every time I work there. Eventually, I have to take care of it anyway.

If you're like me, you can waste a lot of time worrying about something you absolutely have to do but dread doing. I used to squander hours agonizing over such things. I could hardly believe the time it cost me until I finally took Dale Carnegie's do-it-now advice.

A few elective things may be better put off until you are in the mood for them. They will go along that much faster. But you must guard against slipping into a habit of procrastination by convincing yourself that you must

be "in the mood" for everything.


2. Eliminate clutter. I doubt that any individual is so organized that he has "a place for everything and everything in its place." However, being able to put your hands on what you need when you need it beats searching frantically through piles of clutter while the clock ticks on.

Instead of saving those stacks of magazines, clip and file the pertinent information from them. If you haven't used or worn something in the last two years, maybe you should consider disposing of it. And keeping things that are used at the same time together, like the putty knife with the glazing compound, can save you hours every week.

3. Don't go off on tangents. Tangents can be as seductive as Lorelei. I have a writer friend who, every time he has to look up a word in the dictionary, gets so carried away by all the intriguing definitions of other words he runs across, it may take him half an hour to get to the original word. In his profession, the time may not be entirely wasted, but you get the point.

4. Do one thing at a time. Trying to do too many things at once is something like going off on tangents. Let's say the weather looks threatening. You want to get your peas planted before it rains. The ground is tilled; the rows marked. You start for the garden. On the way, you notice a lot of dandelions in your lawn. You drop the packet of peas, go back to the garage, get a weeder and wage war on the dandelions. You work your way across the yard to your forsythia bushes. They have just finished blooming; you see they need to be pruned. Back to the garage you go for pruning shears. When you're half-finished with the forsythia, it starts to rain. You spend five minutes hunting for the packet of peas and the weeder you dropped. The rain continues all day. Now, before you can plant your peas, you will have to get the tiller out again; remark the rows. Finish one thing before starting another.

5. Plan ahead. Any work goes faster if you have all the materials you will need assembled before you begin. Having the proper equipment, and having it ready, is equally important. My work requires a lot of winter-driving. Carrying a bag of kitty litter in the trunk of my car saves me a lot of time. If I get stuck on ice, (Continued on page 34)

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When the Grand Lodge convened in Honolulu this summer, many Elks learned for the first time how active and effective the Elks have been in assisting hospitalized veterans in Hawaii.

PGER Frank Hise, chairman of the Elks National Service Commission, reminded those attending the conclave that more than a decade ago, young American men wounded in the Vietnam Conflict were hospitalized in Tripler Army Medical Center in Honolulu.

Immobile in their casts, these heroes lay critically wounded in sweltering heat.

There were no air conditioners to relieve the effects of the hot afternoon sun. Government cutbacks had indefinitely delayed the installation of a central cooling system.

The hospital executive officer, aware of the Elks interest in servicemen and women and veterans contacted Honolulu Lodge and they in turn brought the matter to the attention of the Elks National Service Commission.

They immediately acted and authorized the purchase of 24 units. Each one bore a plate with the inscription, "Donated by the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the USA."

Much of the discomfort was eliminated and the long road to recovery was made a little easier because with the Order, "Charity is the Cornerstone of Elkdom."

Speaking of Charity, the giving of Christmas food baskets has been a tradition with Elks for many years.

For instance, Hudson, MA, Lodge has been donating food baskets to the needy for something like 44 years. Last year the baskets contained complete dinners and more. There was enough food to last for a week.

The program cost about \$2,000.

But that's not all. Last July, Clawson-Troy, MI, Lodge was named the first All-American Lodge for the many programs in which they participated.

When it came to Christmas baskets for the needy, the project took on a community flavor with help from not only the Elks but school children, a toy company and others.

When it was all said and done Clawson-Troy distributed 226 food baskets just before Christmas.

We don't mind telling you, that lodge room floor looked like a young supermarket as the Elks prepared to distribute the baskets and exercise their charity.

We've another name to add to the list of longtime Elks. Doss Burgess of Roseburg, OR, Lodge was born June 11, 1887, which makes him a young 96 years old.

He joined the Order at Roseburg on Feb. 11, 1911. That means come February he will be celebrating 73 years as an Elk with continuous membership in his original lodge.

Congratulations.

But that's not all. A. J. Crane, PSP of the North Carolina State Elks Association, tells us that the Elks in the Tarheel state believe they have the oldest active elected state association officer in the nation.

George T. Skinner, a PSP, has been elected for the 12th consecutive year as state chaplain. He was 93 years young October 26 and is a charter and life member of Kinston, NC, Lodge.

J. L. T. Miller of East Chicago, IN, Lodge recently retired as a long-time state treasurer of the Indiana Elks Association. He, too, is 90-ish and is still going strong.



Camp Barrett, accredited by the American Camping Association, was established in 1948 by the Tri-State Elks. Gone are the days when campers pitched tents and cooked meals over a campfire. With the exception of an overnight outing in the woods, campers sleep in cabins and eat in the mess hall.

The popularity of Camp Barrett has increased, and four cabins, a pavilion, and bath house will be added by the summer of 1985. Currently, out of the nine weeks of summer camp, two are designated for girls and one for the handicapped. In 1985, the camp hopes to host 700 boys and 700 girls in a co-educational program. The handicapped program has grown to 54 children this summer.

Deserving children attend Camp Barrett at no cost to parents. The Elks pick up the tab of \$170 per week per child.

A small shipping department and the complete 55 year archives of the E.N.F. complete the rundown.

and receive absolutely no compensation or salary of any sort. Indeed, the entire operational expense of the Foundation is paid exclusively by funding from the Grand Lodge-no portion of the Foundation's trust, its earnings or its interest is ever drawn upon for any reason other than the awarding of grants for the various charitable projects, and these funds are drawn exclusively from the earnings of the interest generated by the perpetual Trust Fund.


If a single word had to describe the growth of the Foundation's ability to further its charitable good works, that word would have to be "dynamic." In the past five years alone, the total annual cash outlay for major projects within the Foundation itself

and funds returned to the many state associations for use in their major projects has climbed from slightly in excess of \$1 million to a projected \$5.8 million for the current fiscal

A glance at the Foundation's Annual Report is equally as eve-opening. For example, during the first thirty years of the Foundation's existance, it distributed \$603,350.00 back to the state associations for use in their major projects; during the same period of time, the Foundation's total distributions for all charitable endeavors was \$1.4 million. Compare these figures to those of the last fiscal year, during which the Foundation distributed \$1.3 million in funds to state

# THE 1984 ELKS ROSE PARADE FLOAT



"Santa's Helpers" are coming to town compliments of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks! The BPOE float entry for the 1984 Rose Parade in Pasadena on New Year's Day is a whimsical interpretation of the Santa Claus remembered by all of us as children: enormous, cheery, complete with drooping bifocals, curved pipe and immense flowing white beard. Santa is depicted at rest just prior to beginning his Christmas morning rounds. He is surrounded by elves symbolic of the traditional spirit of volunteerism that typifies Elkdom. The Elks creation is the only Santa Claus entry in the 1984 Rose Parade and was

designed with our favorite project in mind—the children of America! Santa's fluffy beard is decorated with thousands of stems of pure white pampas, his shirt, pants and stockings of whole carnations in red and tangerine with accents of chrysanthemum and poinsettia petals, the elves with colorful gladiola petals and sinuata statice and petals of poinsettias, carnations and marigolds. Thousands of seeds in flesh colors bring out the happy facial characteristics of Santa and his volunteer elves and the scene is completed at the base of the float with additional thousands of roses and orchids in more than a dozen varieties.

sprinkling a little of it under my wheels gets me going quicker than if I have to wait for a push.

If you're tackling a big job for which you will need assistance, round up your helpers well in advance. If you wait until the last minute, you may find that some of them have already made other plans.

Be sure to allow ample time to complete the job. If you think it will take one hour, plan on two. If you have to hurry, you are apt to make time-costing mistakes.

One other thing about planning: did you ever try unsuccessfully to assemble something before first reading the directions?

- 6. Know your limitations. You can't expect to know how to do everything. So if your car breaks down, and you scarcely know the difference between a carburetor and a generator, get a mechanic to fix it. Only if you want to learn mechanics yourself would it be worth your time to monkey with it. Now if you are a mechanic, fix the car. But get an accountant to do your income tax.
- 7. Learn to say "no". Sometimes, because we think a project has merit, we let ourselves be pressured into doing something for which we have little ability and even less enthusiasm. Learn to say "no" to these things. Of course, we all should give some of our time to altruistic endeavor. Fortunately, each one of us has unique likes and talents. Something you abhor, someone else will enjoy doing. You will accomplish more for the time you invest doing those things for which you have the ability and inspiration.
- 8. Don't dwell on past mistakes. Some retrospection is good. How else would we learn from our mistakes? But becoming mired in regret and self-recrimination is counter-productive. When you make an error in judgement-and we all do-rectify it immediately, if possible, and put it from your mind. If it can't be remedied, forget it now. You can't be sure things would have turned out any better if you had followed a different course of action.
- 9. Always have an alternative in mind. You get going faster in the morning if you've planned what you are going to do the night before. But

have a couple of things in mind. If you wake up and hear rain pounding on the roof when you had planned on playing golf or painting the house, you can be plunged into a do-nothing frame of mind. Have a back-up activity to which you can immediately direct your thoughts.

10. Make those odd moments count. You can save time by telephoning to ascertain if an item, a service or a person is available, instead of driving all over town looking. You also save time by consolidating your errands so you only make one trip.

Try to schedule things for off periods. You won't have to wait in line as long at the car wash on Thursday as you will during the busier weekend. Nor as long in the checkout line of a store either.

Doctors are notorious for keeping patients waiting a long time. When you have an appointment, call before starting out and inquire how close to schedule he is running. It can save hours.

There are places where waiting is unavoidable; the dentist's, while your car is being serviced, et cetera. Use these odd moments to balance your checkbook, write or dictate letters, catch up on your reading. Carry a notebook and pen in your car, and make a list of those aforementioned errands. Jot down things you want to do but are likely to forget when you get busy again.

Of course, we can't always spend our time the way we want. We have obligations to our families and to our employers which we must discharge whether we like it or not. However, because of shorter work weeks, more paid holidays and longer vacations, we have more discretionary time than ever before. Let's try to make the most of it.

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

associations alone and distributed in excess of \$4.3 million overall. Projections for the current fiscal year indicate a distribution of \$1.7 millionplus back to the state associations and overall distribution of \$5.8 million.

It would be very easy to overwhelm the reader with even more figures and projections, but the real story of the Elks National Foundation finds its most eloquent expression in the excited eyes of a Hoop Shoot finalist or the look of accomplishment and satisfaction on the face of a client member of KETCH (Kansas Elks Training Center for the Handicapped) or in any of the other Foundation-supported state major projects. Perhaps the joy of a child bound for one of the summer camps sponsored by many of the state associations, with the help of funding from the Foundation, is an accurate measure, or the fact that blind or vision impaired individuals now have hope for the future thanks to Elks-sponsored eyebanks and clinics, a portion of whose funding comes from the Foundation by way of the respective state associa-





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
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The American Heart Association and the Environmental Protection Agency recommend no more than 20 milligrams of sodium per liter of water (about a quart) for people with heart conditions or high blood pressure. Yet there are some local water systems that have more than eight times that amount. That sodium level also carries over into soft drinks and beers that are made using the local water.

How can you find the sodium content of your water? Call your local health department or water company. They are required to test regularly for sodium levels in the water. If you have a well, you will have to get the water tested yourself. Your local health department can help with that, too.

However, even if the water from the reservoir or well is low in sodium, there still may be high salt levels in the water from your faucet if you use a water softener or conditioner. Some of them use salt to remove minerals, and that puts the salt into your water. If you do have a water softener that is charged with salt, you might want to consider using another source of water for cooking and drinking.

Bottled water is not necessarily the answer to high sodium levels, either. (Continued on page 46)

Some bottled water, particularly mineral waters, may have a lot of sodium as well. However, many bottled waters list the minerals on the label so that you can select one with low sodium.

If you want to lower your salt intake, check your water. Stop adding salt at the table and when you are cooking. You can do a lot to keep foods tasty without salt by adding various herbs and spices. Also, check the labels of canned and processed foods. They can have high sodium levels even if you don't add any salt during cooking.

To help keep sodium under control, send for a copy of the U.S. Department of Agriculture book, The Sodium Content of Your Food. It has a list of almost 800 foods and condiments and their sodium content by portion, as well as a list of the sodium content of a number of common over-the-counter drugs. The Sodium Content of Your Food is \$4.25 from the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 138L, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

When considering an advertised special, read the ad carefully and call or visit the dealer to find out about all the terms and conditions of the offer. Then compare the specials advertised by other dealers.

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

#### QUESTIONS ABOUT LOW INTEREST LOANS

Listed below are some financing questions you should consider when talking to dealers.

- Will you be charged a higher price for the car to qualify for the low-rate financing? Would the price be lower if you paid cash, or supplied your own financing from your bank or credit union?
- Does the financing require a largerthan-usual downpayment? Say 25 or 30 percent?
- Are there limits on the length of the loan? In other words, are you required to repay the loan in a short period of time, say 12 or 24 months?







 Does the advertised trade-in allowance apply to all cars, regardless of their condition? Are there any deductions for high mileage, dents, or rust?

- Does the large trade-in allowance make the cost of the new car higher than it would be without the trade-in?
   You might be giving back the big tradein allowance by paying more for your new car.
- Is the dealer who offers high trade-in allowances and free or low-cost options actually giving you a better price on the car than another dealer who does not offer such promotions?
- Does the "dealer's invoice" reflect the actual amount that the dealer pays the manufacturer? You can consult consumer or automotive publications for information about what the dealer pays.
- Does the "dealer's invoice" include the cost of options, such as rustproofing or waterproofing, that have already been added to your car? Is the dealer (Continued on page 52)





New York galleries. Like the Wyndham and the Algonquin, the American Stanhope has its own celebrity list. Paul McCartney uses it as a hideaway, as do Peter O'Toole and Dick Cavett. Ambassadors and senators have autographed its register. Guests dine at a sidewalk cafe and high tea is taken in the drawing room with its picture-covered walls. By now possibly you've gathered that the Stanhope isn't one of those inexpensive little Mahattan hotels. And indeed it is not. Rates start at around \$125 for singles and \$150 for doubles. but where else can one dispatch a postcard home, boasting of snoozing in a little museum across the street from one of the world's biggest?

New in our survey this year is the trim little Doral Park (70 Park Ave., New York 10016). Here the cast of "The French Connection" took shelter while filming on location in New York. Rooms are cheery and there's a swinging little bar where Manhattanites gather at the cocktail hour. Waiter/bellman Erwin Wallner once served as the private butler for the American High Commissioner in Austria, and at the Doral Park he's familiar to Jackie Gleason as well as other celebrities. Again, here is a small (only 200 rooms) hotel with style as well as warmth, the rates starting at under \$100.

The Doral's little sister, the Tuscany (120 East 39th St., New York 10016) is a repeat selection on our list of small hotels (with similar rates as those at the Doral). As neat as a Swiss inn, the Tuscany like others in this survey is noted for its service as well as a certain homelike quality. Bellman Jimmy McNamara, an Irish expatriate, has been greeting guests at the Tuscany for years, telling how it is "biggest little hotel in New York." Depending on the location of one's room, it also could be the quietest hotel in Manhattan (ask for accommodations facing the garden court at the rear). Just off the lobby, the Tuscany's restaurant features an aura of romance, with candlelight, fresh flowers and quiet elegance.

Equally charming is the Sheraton-

Russell on Park Avenue at 37th Street. The lobby with its book-lined shelves presents a wholesome, oldfashioned goodness; there's a snug little piano bar and an equally cozy restaurant, and on the roof the management features a putting green, flowers and trees. Yes, smack in the heart of midtown Manhattan.

And then, well, there's the little Elysee (60 East 54th St., New York 10022) that continues to attract the likes of actor James Caan and others on the celebrity list. Not because the Elysee is particularly attractive, but because it's a family-run operation with a caring staff that believes in service. The Elysee was a favorite of the late Tallulah Bankhead as well as Ethel and John Barrymore and Tennessee Williams. (A monkey and a love bird belonging to Miss Bankhead were treated royally by the staff, and the late Robert Ruark described the Elysee as "the incredible inn.")

Inside the Elysee is a trim showplace whose rooms are named rather than numbered (there are the Variety, the Valencia, the Buttery, Imperial, Le Cordon Bleu and even one that features a Japanese motif with shoji screens and a tatami mat). Rates: from under \$100. Hotelier Leon Quain welcomes back regular guests with champagne and splits of wine. Says Quain: "It costs me a lot of bucks, but what the heck, it's good for business. Besides, I'm a sincere guy." Quain admits he's a fixerupper. A while back he took a pantry and turned it into a bath. And only recently he installed telephones in every bathroom. "Who knows," says Quain, "when a guest might get the urge to call."

While conducting our hotel survey, we ran across one Harold Goldberg, who is known about town as Manhattan's celebrated leader of the oddball tour. As founder of Adventure on a Shoestring, the 51-year-old Goldberg is prepared to introduce New York's visitors to sights and individuals seldom seen even by the natives. Doors pop open for Goldberg all over town. He leads tours through fortune-cookie factories, the world's biggest flower market, a swordfighting school. Once he tied up traffic while his group strolled through the Lincoln Tunnel. Another time he took his flock aboard an aircraft carrier moored at 46th Street and the Hudson River. In Hell's Kitchen he points out battlefields used during the

old gang wars. And on 49th Street there's the church where Rudolph Valentino's funeral was held.


Like the proverbial postman, neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays Goldberg from the completion of his appointed rounds. His devotion to duty, his determination to get the job done was never demonstrated more dramatically than during the big Con Edison blackout in 1965. On this particular night Goldberg was meeting his flock at a heart specialist's to hear a lecture about life's stresses in the Big Apple.

Even though Goldberg's world had come to a standstill, he was undaunted. With transistor radio in hand (to keep track of the blackout) and flashlight he groped his way through the darkness to the doctor's office. Alas, the production fizzled. Not only didn't the medic show, neither did his group.

The tariff for tours averages out to about \$3. Out-of-towners who don't become members are assessed \$4.50. Goldberg feels it's a steal—peanuts, compared to those expensive Manhattan tours. Besides, where else could you figure to chat with a vampire researcher, a heart transplant surgeon or a shrink specializing in body language, all in the course of a day or two? Goldberg offers this maxim: "People are more interesting than buildings." Not that he doesn't deal in buildings, too, mind you. He does. Even bridges. The fact is, his favorite annual outing is to the Brooklyn Bridge. Goldberg grows pensive when he speaks of the span. "More songs, poetry and prose have been devoted to the Brooklyn Bridge than any other engineering structure in the world," he says. And so annually, rain or shine, sleet or snow, he and his entourage march across the famous landmark, carrying a cake and singing "Happy Birthday, Brooklyn Bridge."

Goldberg seldom gets emotionally involved in these events. It's another matter with his guests. Once after visiting a truck drivers' school, three women in his group returned to sign up for the course. "Two graduated," Goldberg recalls, "and the other ended up marrying the instructor." There have been other marriages, but Adventure on a Shoestring is not a game for the lovelorn. Goldberg takes it seriously, picking and choosing his subjects with great care. And while he searches for the unusual,

there's the lighter side, too. Consider the tour to a pie-throwing firm in Manhattan—one of those outfits that agrees to plaster a friend or foe with a gooey custard. It was, as everyone on the tour agreed, a smash hit. Another group visited a chap who was hoping to raise the Andrea Doria with a submarine he was building in his backyard in Coney Island. The idea, Goldberg says, is that it doesn't take big bucks to enjoy New York.

Occasionally, Goldberg puts together tours outside Manhattan. To places like Howe Caverns in Upstate New York and Frank Sinatra's old neighborhood in Hoboken, N.J., where Marlon Brando appeared in the film, "On the Waterfront." Shoestringers have exchanged pleasantries with hypnotists, flamenco dancers, casting agents, jugglers, Broadway directors, a harpsichord maker, the head of a roommate-finding service, a doctor who cures insomnia, acupuncturists, artists, stripteasers, publishers and composers. They ride helicopters over New York City and cruise around the island on steamers; they tour breweries, dine at the United Nations and attend Off-Broadway plays for nickels and dimes.

Born in Queens, Goldberg is a talking encyclopedia; he's familiar with scores of museums and theater groups and can tick off the names of dozens of restaurants where you can dine for a song. One of the favorite outings: a tour of the Met. Shoestringers view the costumes, visit the prop rooms and stroll across the stage itself. If you would believe Goldberg, New Yorkers are the "warmest" people on earth. "Ask them a question or direction and they'll go out of their way to help." On occasion Shoestringers take in the more common attractions, but there's a difference. Instead of joining an ordinary tour to the Statue of Liberty, for example, they chat with the statue's keeper. It's the same with any touristy event-the behind-the-scenes approach. Again, if you would believe Goldberg, New York can be cheap as well as fun.
