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

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
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

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Past Grand Exalted Ruler Ronald J. Dunn



RONALD J. DUNN, Grand Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks for the 1963-64 lodge year, died at his home in Oneida, New York on the morning of December 6, 1983. He was born February 22, 1903, in State Bridge, New York and was educated in the public schools of the City of Oneida, New York.

He received his B A degree from Holy Cross College, Worcester, Massachusetts in 1925 and his LL B from Fordham University School of Law in 1928. He commenced his practice of law in the City of Oneida, New York in the same year and was subsequently elected to serve as Oneida City Judge for three terms. In addition he served as a clerk of Madison County, New York Surrogate Court. He had the reputation as one of the most capable trial lawyers in central New York State. He and his son, Peter M. Dunn, were partners in the Dunn and Dunn law firm of Oneida, New York. He was a member and Past President of the Madison, New York, County Bar Association and also New York State and American Bar Association.

He was the recipient of the Oneida, New York Rotary Club's Roses to the Living Award, the Man of the Year Award from the Oneida New York Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Silver Beaver Award from the Boy Scouts of America. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Oneida Public Library, the Board of Governors of the Yahnundasis Golf Club in Utica, New York; the Oneida Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Directors of the Oneida Valley National Bank.

During his illustrious lifetime, he exhibited continuous devotion to his beloved family, his legal profession and the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

The many attributes he possessed, among which were his high ideals of service and unique qualities of leadership, were recognized immediately by his fellow lodge members following his initiation in 1929 into Oneida, New York Lodge 767. Accordingly, he was elevated by his lodge through all the subordinate stations and became Exalted Ruler in 1936. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in 1941 by the then Grand Exalted Ruler John McClelland. He was elected President of the New York State Elks Association in 1945 and served as Grand Esteemed Leading Knight in 1947 and again in 1951. In 1953 he was elected to the Board of Grand Trustees and became Chairman of that body in 1957. He was Justice of the Grand Forum from 1960 until 1963, which office he resigned when he was elected Grand Exalted Ruler at the Grand Lodge Convention in San Francisco, California in 1963.

He became Chairman of the Grand Lodge Advisory Committee in 1967. Poor health caused him to resign this position in 1977 when he was once again honored by being named Chairman Emeritus of the Grand Lodge Advisory Committee. From 1969 until his death, he served with distinction as a member of the Elks National Service Commission.

Past Grand Exalted Ruler Dunn is survived by his wife, the former Helen L. Williams, whom he married in Canastota, New York on December 28, 1935; a son, Peter M. Dunn; a daughter Ann (Mrs. Donald Morey) and eight grandchildren. Services were held December 9, 1983 at St. Patrick's Church, Oneida, New York. Past Grand Chaplain Francis A. White was the homilist.

CONSIDER EQUITY CONVERSION

Are you (or your parents) house-rich but cash-poor? If so, a variety of "equity conversion" or "reverse equity" plans are becoming available to help older homeowners convert the value of a house to cash, while retaining the home as a place to live. The income can be used to repair the house, to meet medical expenses, or simply to raise your standard of living. Each of these plans has one thing in common: repayment can be deferred until a later date. Each also has risks along with advantages.

Here's a rundown of some current equity conversion plans. Bear in mind, as you read, that not all are available everywhere.

Reverse Annuity Mortgage

The opposite of a conventional mortgage loan, the reverse annuity mortgage is a loan paid to the homeowner in monthly increments, the amount determined by the amount of home equity borrowed against, the interest rate, and the length of the loan. The loan amount is typically from 60 to 80 percent of the appraised value of the property (and this, as other equity conversion methods, is appropriate only when there is little or no debt already outstanding on the house). The length of the loan is typically five to ten years (a potential problem if an elderly homeowner outlives the loan). Some programs are publicly-sponsored, designed for people with lower incomes; other, private programs, have no income restrictions.

Under a program of the San Francisco Development Fund, reverse annuity mortgages are offered to people over 62 years old, living in owner-occupied single family homes or condominiums, with low to moderate income. Here's an example of how this program works, provided by the Special Committee on Aging of the U.S. Senate: A reverse mortgage loan of \$120,000, at a fixed rate of 14 percent for a 10-year term, plus a 1 percent loan origination fee and other charges, would yield a monthly income of \$463. If an initial disbursement of \$5,000 is made to make repairs on the house, the monthly income would be \$386. After 10 years the loan must be repaid or renegotiated.

Under a brand new program offered

by American Homestead Mortgage Corporation of New Jersey, homeowners over 65 can mortgage their homes and receive monthly payments until they sell the house or die; the loan can then be repaid with proceeds from the sale of the house. Borrowers can add to their monthly income by pledging a percentage of the property's appreciation to American Homestead along with the mortgage amount. For example: a 75-year-old man, pledging 50 percent of appreciation, would receive \$108 each month on a \$70,000 house mortgaged at 12.5 percent. With a 100 percent pledge, he could receive \$210.

Sale/leaseback

Under this method of tapping home equity, an investor purchases the house and grants the seller either life tenancy or a more limited tenancy in exchange for a specified rental payment. The investors receive the tax benefits of ownership. And the seller, who can receive payment in a lump sum, in equal monthly payments based upon an annuity purchased by the investor, or in monthly mortgage payments from which the monthly rent is deducted, may be able to claim the one-time capital gains deduction of up to \$125,000 on the sale that is available to the homeowners over the age of 55.

A contract must spell out the seller's right to continued occupancy, the rent schedule, and responsibility for the future maintenance and care of the property. Under a program offered by the Fouratt Plan of California the lease establishes a lifetime right of occupancy. The investor/buyer is responsible for major repairs and maintenance, property taxes, and insurance. Here's an example of how such a plan might work: A 79-year-old widow sells her house, appraised at \$80,000, to an investor for \$63,200. She receives a 10 percent downpayment of \$6,320 and a 12-year promissory note for the \$56,880 balance. She receives a monthly payment of \$679 from the investor, including interest at 10 percent, from which she pays rent of \$285 back to the investor, leaving \$394 as her net income. The buyer purchased an annuity which will

IT'S YOUR BUSINESS

PRODUCTIVITY CONCERNS ALL OF US

A number of stories in the daily media and from my own experiences as a business and public relations consultant cause me to reluctantly agree with an article in *USA TODAY* that said America's "biggest obstacle to progress in productivity is management that simply doesn't know what to do."

The newspaper reported on a survey of 700 industrial engineers which found 63.5 percent think managers, supervisors and owners don't know how to improve the quality or quantity of goods and services.

In fact, managers and workers believe that Japan will overtake the U.S. within a decade, the article claimed.

To me, that's a self-fulfilling prophesy. Say it enough, blame the other side enough and squabble continually about it and it's bound to occur.

Personally, I don't agree with the premise nor do I believe it will necessarily happen. At the same time, I don't feel I'm either naive or a partisan optimist. But what is most disturbing is that a number of Americans are willing to accept such a prediction.

I've been to Japan; I've met and interviewed Japanese industrial leaders and respect their resolve and ambition. It was the late 1950s, Mitsubishi wasn't a household word here, neither was Nissan or Toshiba. But Coca-Cola, RCA, General Motors, Ford and a host of others were well-recognized in the Asian countries I visited. They still are.

American know-how and technology haven't been eroded. American workers — blue and white collar—appear to have less motivation today than during previous decades.

The USA TODAY piece offers some evidence. The survey noted that nearly half of the engineers queried said they are "not very enthusiastic and optimistic" about their workplace. But a number of these engineers offered a solution to the problem that sounds logical. Sixty-three percent said personal recognition would boost morale and most experts I've talked to believe morale is a major factor in productivity. Personal recognition, it's interesting to note, ranked higher than monetary rewards in the survey.

But engineers aren't the only group to provide such a view. At a Northeastern

private college where the salary schedule is below the state college level as well as some other private institutions, the faculty were surveyed about their concerns.

More than half of the faculty replied and again the answer was not what might be expected; a demand for higher salaries. The number one concern of the faculty? The quality of students' performance in their classrooms. The salary scale was ninth on their list of priorities!

Both surveys and a number of others which have appeared in recent years should tell management that when it comes to productivity, their employees—whether professional, skilled or production workers—have sound answers and are eager to help. And they should be praised, not scorned or intimidated for trying to create better products or services, and, obviously, better places in which to live and work.

Management has as much listening and learning to do as any employee in the plant. Furthermore, owners need to monitor middle management carefully as they implement policy and create internal and external relations for the company.

I've found that some employees in family businesses lose enthusiasm rapidly when they discover that the family has no intention of rewarding them with promotion. Perhaps it's a relative who steps into the position upon death or retirement, perhaps it's a family member who is promoted above others to take the founder's position. The message to employees is clear; hard work won't improve your status or responsibility in the company. You may be given more money—good people are hard to find—but personal recognition may have come elsewhere.

Corporations can dampen the enthusiasm and the productivity of hardworking employees just as easily.

Several years ago, a business executive acquaintance told me how he finally walked out of a management position after discovering how several others had been promoted at his expense. "I was being paid well but each new vice president had used my internal memoranda—my ideas and information—as if it was





In his acceptance speech, GER Cantoli outlined the need for Elks to become aware of the extent of the drug problem in our society and to support and participate in a nationwide program against the ever-increasing use of illegal drugs by our school children.

The Grand Lodge Youth Activities brochure provides guidelines for this program. In addition a Grand Lodge Drug Awareness Manual has been prepared to assist each Exalted Ruler in implementing the program.

State Drug Awareness Chairmen have been appointed in each state and in some instances, District Drug Awareness Chairmen have been named.

Your lodge should also have appointed a Drug Awareness Chairman. If you'd like to help stamp out this problem with our youth, see your Exalted Ruler.

Georgia Elks are "proud as punch" of their major project, the Elks Aidmore Children's Home at Conyers.

Total contributions this past year reached \$121,366. Lodge contributions reached a 10-year high of \$73,955. Not


Today Tom is an Elk. He was initiated into Montebello, Calif., Elks Lodge No. 2051.

Performed by a group of professional actors, the presentation provides a way for teenagers to give thoughtful examination to the decisions they are making regarding drug and alcohol use.





their own and taken credit for it. I was frustrated at first but finally I got up the nerve to take my case to the company president. He listened and then abruptly told me that I obviously wasn't much of a team player. Such complaints should have been handled through my superiors, not his office. The problem was, of course, each of my superiors were the very people taking my ideas," he said.

His reward came several jobs later when an energetic young vice-president became president, spotted his ambition and rewarded it.

Some time ago while advising a client about consulting his employees concerning a major decision he had made on reorganizing the company, I was stunned by his comment. I asked how he was going to inform his workers. "They don't need to know until it happens," he said with a quick smile and a wink. "The less they know the less they have to think about."

I thought he was kidding but I politely pointed out that if we took his premise seriously it could cause difficulties and create bad management/employee relations in the near future. Problems, I was well aware, that could be disruptive to the company, the community and the employees.

He dropped his smile quickly and snarled, "What are you doing? Are you joining them?" he hissed pointing to a group of secretaries and staff members in the outer office. "They're paid well, they will do what they're told."

What is needed?

Managers who understand their tasks well, who respect their workers and encourage their participation in a well-defined structure that is constantly looking for ways to reward creative effort and hard work.

A wounded Marine who was a member of the U.S. peace-keeping force in Lebanon said it best when he greeted his commanding officer after he was so severely injured by the recent Beirut bomb blast he couldn't talk.





KENNETH V. CANTOLI **IN WASHINGTON**

Drug Awareness Program Praised by Congressmen



"We believe drug abuse poses today's greatest threat to our country's most precious resource: its youth," said Grand Exalted Ruler Kenneth V. Cantoli to members of Congress in announcing the new national drug abuse education program on November 9, 1983.

Cantoli sought congressional endorsement of the program at a reception for the 91 members of Congress who are Elks. Rep. Peter W. Rodino, Jr. (D-NJ) and Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-NJ) hosted the event held in the House Judiciary Committee chambers.

Cantoli outlined plans for the long-term drug awareness program. These plans, previously detailed in The Elks Magazine, include the appointment and training of drug awareness chairmen in every state, and training seminars for all 2270 lodges, where members will be responsible for implementation in their local communities.

The national program funded through the Grand Lodge will include public service announcements to be distributed to radio and television stations throughout the country, and a six-part radio and newspaper series on the hazards of drug abuse among young people. For the first six months, the Elks National Foundation has allocated funds to begin the national effort, Cantoli told the congressmen. A full transcript of GER Cantoli's remarks to the congressmen follows.

Cantoli's remarks were made a part of the Congressional Record by Sen. Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ), who commended the Elks "for their outstanding leadership on this critical problem."

Urging endorsement of the program, Cantoli stated that, "The Elks are committed, leader by leader, lodge by lodge, member by member, to eradicating the use of harmful drugs among our children. The minds and bodies of our young people are at risk. Our moral fiber and national character are at stake."

Among the congressmen attending the reception was the Elks' newest member, Rep. Sam Stratton (D-NY). Congressman Stratton was initiated into Schenectady Lodge No. 480 the night before. GER Cantoli and PGER Robert Yothers signed Rep. Stratton's membership card at the great family of Elkdom. reception.

- In that same year, we contributed over \$5.6 million dollars to youth programs.
- The handicapped and needy received an additional \$9.4 million dollars from the Elks last year.
- In all, our charitable contributions for 1982 exceeded \$25 million dollars. and that does not include the millions of volunteer hours contributed by our members.



This year we are embarking on a new program-one that could prove to be the most important in the history of our Order. Last year the Elks conducted a national survey of mayors to determine the greatest areas of need for volunteer help in our nation's communities. In response to the findings of that survey, the Elks are undertaking a national drug awareness education program. We view this program as a long-term commitment in addition to the yearly special projects and other volunteer works of the Order.

Drug awareness chairmen have been named in every state and training seminars are being conducted now for those chairmen. They will duplicate that seminar for all of our 2270 lodges in the country, where members will be responsible for implementing the drug awareness education program in their local communities.

The Grand Lodge will produce Public Service Announcements that will be distributed to radio and television stations throughout the country. It will also be sponsoring a six-part radio series and a six-part newspaper series on the hazards of drug abuse among our young people. For the first six months, the Elks Foundation has allocated almost one quarter of a million dollars to begin this program.

We believe drug abuse poses today's greatest threat to our country's most precious resource: its youth. Drug abuse destroys the potentials of tomorrow's leaders before those potentials can develop. If this trend is not reversed our citizens will be severely hampered in their ability to find and elect men and women of your caliber and talents to lead our country in the future. Our businesses and industries will be restricted in finding and developing teams of executives, managers and employees.

Our educational institutions will suffer -in fact we are seeing the effects already in high schools. Students, suffering from the effects of short term memory loss as a result of getting high on drugs, have literally lost vital portions of their formal education. Facts, figures, insights and experiences are irretrievably gone; pushed out of recall by mind-dulling drugs.

We simply cannot allow this trend to continue. The Elks are committed, leader by leader, lodge by lodge, member by member, to eradicating the use of harmful drugs among our children. We greatly appreciate your support in our efforts to combat this insidious chemical intrusion in our society. The minds and bodies of our young people are at risk. Our moral fiber and national character is at stake. We urge your endorsement and assistance in this national effort."

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




maintain the \$679 monthly payment after the loan is paid off.

There are other methods of equity conversion. In split equity the elderly homeowner retains title to the house and lifetime tenancy; the sponsoring agency—usually a public body—makes payments to the homeowner in exchange for taking title to the property at the homeowner's death. With a deferred payment loan elderly homeowners can draw upon home equity to maintain and repair their homes, while deferring payment of all principal and interest on the loan either for a specified term or until the house is sold.

Is home equity conversion a good thing? It can provide needed income, but it also contains some risks. Here are some guidelines suggested by the Senate Special Committee on Aging:

- Equity conversion provides more money when the value of the home is greater, but even the equity in a modest home can provide some welcome extra cash. Equity conversion, however, is practical only when the home is not encumbered by existing debt.
- Equity conversion plans which guarantee lifetime income payments are most appropriate for homeowners over the age of 75. For people in their sixties

a lifetime annuity may be too expensive to be practical.

- High mortgage interest rates have an adverse effect on income amounts under reverse annuity arrangements.
 Such mortgages may provide more money, and be more readily available, when rates are lower.
- If you are interested in equity conversion, be sure to compare several different plans and their costs in interest plus fees and commissions. Under some plans you may receive less than full market value for your property, and may not receive the benefit of subsequent appreciation.
- Look at the financial stability of the lender before you make a commitment; you don't want a lender who may default on monthly payments.
- Consider the effect that inflation may have on the spending value of your monthly payments. Ask to see the amount of income which would result under various payment schedules and interest rates.
- If variable interest rates are employed, be sure you understand the impact of any rate change on both payments and loan balance.
- Find out if there are any prepayment penalties or penalties for revoking the agreement. Find out, too, the tax status of payments under the agreement.

Equity conversion, especially because it comes in so many shapes and forms,


is extremely complicated. It's very important to obtain full disclosure of all the related facts and figures-all of the above, plus the schedule of payments and any adjustments of interest or payment level, your equity position over time, the amount and terms of any annuity, and so on. It's also very important to discuss the plan thoroughly with your attorney and with any heirs, to be sure that your rights and interests are fully protected and that the consequences of the plan in terms of repayment of the loan, eventual ownership, and disposal of the property are fully understood by all parties concerned.


If you're thinking of heating with wood and want a bit of serious comment or advice:


1. Stove set-up and safety: Stove should sit on a metal apron about two feet out from wall. Peak fire danger is where stovepipe goes through wall into chimney (or to outdoors). Pipe gets extremely hot and must be well insulated where it meets wall. Logs usually burn at a sedate heat level; fast-blazing light wood is more dangerous.

2. Soot build-up can lead to chimney fires, but if you burn seasoned dry natural wood (no creosoted railroad ago, we've had no trouble. Do clean 3. Wood selection. If you buy wood, get seasoned hardwood split logs that can be delivered dry. Rain-dampened dry. If you cut your own, give live wood a year to season—especially pine. If you seek wood to be burned immediately, as we did, don't pick up branches that have been long on the ground. Select dead branches and trees that are in the air, and favor those that are bare of bark (moisture

settles under bark). snap back dangerously.

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

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

Your Own Computer... Boon or Bane?

But don't expose your wallet or credit cards yet. You are not ready to buy. You are probably not even ready to decide if you should buy.

If you do all this for a reasonable period of time (at least weeks if not months) some things will begin to register. You will notice that there are three broad categories of personal computers. The first is devoted essentially to games. Now, while zapping green Martians may be fun, these glorified pinball machines are not true computers since they can do only one thing. (In the jargon, they are "dedicated" units.) For this reason, we can ignore this type altogether.

The second broad group consists of inexpensive models that either look like rather large calculators or are basically keyboards that hook up to your TV or a special separatelypurchased "monitor". A monitor is nothing more than a TV but it lacks channel selectors, antennas, and other things that make it possible to pull in a program. No matter, in this crazy world, they will cost more than a TV! (See, you're not only learning some of the language but a few facts of life.) Those in the third group have a keyboard, plus a monitor (separate or attached) and something called "disk drives". You can also spot them by their price tags which start at well over a thousand bucks and go up...way up.

As so often is true in today's world, there is an unfortunate inescapable correlation between "what you pays and what you gets". You cannot expect to spend \$400 and get everything a \$4000 unit has to offer. On the other hand, the less expensive one may be all you want or need. We now come to the key question: What are you going to use it for? If you know the answer to this already, you are in a minority. You are about to be let in on a little secret. Until you have and use a computer, you will never know the real answer to this question. As with so many things in life, you have to experience it to really understand it.

There are two broad reasons why people buy a computer: for home or business use. For home use, some people want to become "computer literate," or they want their children to have this benefit. Other reasons often mentioned are to "balance the checkbook" or "keep track of my record (or cooking recipes, etc.) collection." Let me simply say these latter are not good reasons to buy. You can do any of these things more quickly and easily with a \$10 calculator and a handful of file cards. Don't misunderstand. If you have a computer, you should try to do these things, but do it for practice and educational reasons, not practical. On the other hand, simply teaching yourself or your family to use a computer could be one of the wisest investments you can make.

For business use, the answer is simple. There is hardly any business that cannot do some things better, more quickly and less expensively with a computer. Unfortunately, business buyers tend to look for a machine that they can put in front of a secretary and expect her to be a whiz in a week or so. It doesn't work that way! Someone has to learn how to run it! My advice is that the first person to do so should be the owner or manager of the business. If you fail to do this, you could find yourself at the complete mercy of whoever knows how to run the "magic machine." Once you computerize your business, you have crossed the Rubicon.

There are innovations that can help make various systems more "user friendly" and much easier with which to gain proficiency. "Menu-driven" systems, for example, enable the new user to select the most efficient programs easily; "Touch Screens" and "Mouse Cursors" allow the new user to give certain systems commands without mastering some of the more esoteric signs of "computerese;" "Help Screens" give the user instructions describing program tasks and how to initiate these tasks. Even raw beginners can get a solid understanding once they put their "hands-on" this kind of hardware. There is no turning back. You had very well better be able to control the situation!

This shouldn't stop you. Learning the operation of a computer should be a challenge. After all, you did have to study and learn many things (some by long experience) before you became a competent businessman, didn't you? In retrospect, wasn't it

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
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well worth the effort? If, however, you have any qualms about spending the time and effort (more than you can imagine at first) to learn, then my advice is to forget it. You can get into some nasty situations if you leave it to somebody else.

If I haven't discouraged you by now, what's the next step? Go back and read my advice about shopping for a computer. The real key is to take your time. Whether for home or business use, you are talking an expenditure of both time and money. The more time you spend in the attempt to turn this "expenditure" into an "investment" the greater will be your return.

If you take this road, let me give you a few tips. For business use, check out service. Computers are (really!) machines. They break down and they wear out. Let that happen when your payroll is half done and you have a problem. Be sure you can get someone down fast! That means in-house service. Expensive? You bet. Necessary? Absolutely.

Buy your business computer from a manufacturer or a store that specializes in business systems. If you see a bunch of outer space games in the store, walk out. Not only do they not know your needs, it's almost a sure bet they have little or no back-up service. For a real business computer, you are talking a minimum investment of \$4000 and you can go up... way up!

For any real business applications, you must have at least one storage medium (disk drive) that is removable, for the sake of back-up of data program files. For most small businesses, two drives are absolutely essential: the removable (floppy disk) drive and a second disk drive. The choice of the second system, either floppy or hard disk must be determined before purchase, based on the user's individual need.

It is not hard to change a disk now and then; in fact, it can save the user literally hundreds of dollars. But, if it is determined that your business is large enough to require the much more extensive data storage capabilities of the hard disk drive, it should be considered at the outset. Although it is no great effort to add a hard disk system later, it does require a substantial financial expenditure; consideration must be given to this matter when the system is purchased to avoid the additional expense of

subsequently adding a hard disk drive to a system comprised of dual floppy disks.

Every business user must also buy a printer. The home user will probably want to add one if he doesn't get it with his computer. Choose your printer as carefully as you pick a computer. There are many kinds available. You can probably forget the state-of-the-art stuff (laser printers) unless your father is an oil sheik. At the other extreme, stay away from "thermal" printers. These are very cheap toys which use a special heatsensitive paper. The output is goshawful and most don't hold up to even minimal use.

That leaves two kinds that are worth investigating. The most common, and less expensive, is the "dotmatrix" type. This produces printing that looks "typically computerish". If you look at each letter closely, it is made up of fine individual dots. The primary advantages of this type are cost (lower) and print speed (much faster). The disadvantage is appearance.

The other kind of printer is technically called "full impact" but more commonly "letter quality". This produced results comparable to a top quality electronic typewriter. Some of them (at the low end of the price scale) use IBM "balls". The better ones use a "daisywheel" (they are about 3" in diameter and the type is at the end of long "petals"—hence the name.)

Dual-speed dot-matrix printers are now available. These, at a lower speed, will produce near correspondence quality output, at top speed they produce "computerish" but readable results.

Matrix printers start in the \$200 price range and some of these aren't bad for home use. For business, figure at least \$1000 for a medium quality unit that will stand up for a while. Letter quality machines start around \$600 and go to the \$5000 range. Again, except for home use, forget the low end. Figure on at least \$2000 for a real business machine. If you want a standard to compare, look at the Xerox (Diablo) 630. It is one of the best available and has just about everything you'll need.

If your primary use is for correspondence, reports, manuals and the like, go for a letter quality printer. For statistics or accounting, a matrix printer will do. It won't look as good,

but it will be adequate and, more important for this type work, it will print considerably faster. For those in need of both, consider the dual-speed dot matrix printer. Whichever type you decide upon, be sure it has a full 15" wide carriage. It will cost little if any more and provides much more flexibility. For business, be sure your printer will accept a "tractor" adapter which allows use of paper with sprocket holes along the sides. You need this for good register and form work.

When choosing a home computer,

do it like a businessman. In other words, shop for value. That doesn't always mean the lowest price. You should be sure of one thing: Buy a computer that can be upgraded. In other words, if you want to add on devices like a printer, disk drives, etc., be sure it can be done. Don't take anyone's word for this. Check it out.

Take nothing for granted. The people who are most happy with their home computers are those who have gradually added to their original in-

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Inside the **Grand Lodge** Computer Department

Staff Report

It can be said without fear of contradiction that the advent of the computer age has revolutionized many facets of American life. Not only have computers come to the fore in business and industry, they are making themselves felt in ways that were undreamed of only a few short years ago.

Recognizing the many advantages of computerization in January of 1981, the Grand Lodge Advisory Committee created a new Computer Department within the Order. Rudy R. Wicht, a computer professional with ten years of related experience, was named to supervise the selection, acquisition, installation and utilization of a sophisticated computer system.

Wicht's assessment of the Order's immediate computer needs, combined with an eye toward adaptability and expandibility for future needs eventually narrowed the choice of a computer system down to the Hewlett-Packard 3000, Series 40. The system is made up of four disk drive units with 1.6 gigabytes (1.6 billion bytes) of memory storage, a main computer unit featuring an additional 1.5 megabytes (1.5 million bytes) of memory storage, a high-speed tape drive, and two line-printers.

Other factors influencing this choice of system were its high rate of productivity, its track record of reliability and the high level of customer support offered by the manufacturer. Further, the system has proven itself to be cost-effective; requiring only a small staff working as a professional team to keep it running efficiently and at peak productivity.

The computer performs literally dozens of important functions but its primary areas of involvement may be sketched by identifying the departments utilizing the system and by giving a brief description of the functions being utilized.



Although the system is busy now, Supervisor Wicht, working with Department Heads and Supervisors, are jointly formulating proposals for even further streamlining of many existing manual and antiquated computer systems. These proposals will achieve faster and more efficient recall of records, timely and more accurate reports and speedier handling of

subscribers' change of address requests.

In short, from the tabulation of an individual lodge's membership roster to the formulation of multi-million dollar charitable projections, the Grand Lodge Computer Department functions at peak efficiency due in large part to the cooperation, assistance and direct involvement of such department heads as Grand Secretary Stanley F. Kocur, ENF Director James C. Varenhorst and Elks Magazine Publisher/General Manager John R. Ryan. These men, their staff members and supervisors provide invaluable input aimed at achieving even better service to the Order in the future.

vestment. Some of them end up with a system that could be used in business. You may not want to go that far, but you should have the option. One way to assure this is not to fall for the "toys" on the market being sold as computers. You definitely should have a "typewriter-like" keyboard. You will quickly outgrow the "calculator button" and "membrane" kinds.

Not everyone will agree with me on this, but I would say anything less than \$750 rock-bottom minimum is not going to give you the future potential you may very well want in a few months.

One final caution. Don't buy a computer which uses magnetic tape cassettes for storage. They will do nothing but give you aggravation and disappointments. For home use, you can start off with one floppy disk drive instead. Be certain you can add on a second one without any problems. That means you have to really study the literature because a salesman can honestly say "You can add a second drive anytime" without mentioning that it can be a major operation! You will probably be better off by buying the best you can afford right from the beginning.

You may also be puzzled about when to buy. Should you wait for prices to come down further? Wait for the Japanese to come up with something new? Wait for the next generation of computers? My advice is to buy when you know what you want and can afford it. No one can see into the future.

I honestly think a computer can be a boon, but it can too often be a disaster. To prevent the latter, learn all you can before you buy. Listen to everyone and compare ideas. Above all, take your time. Just following those three simple rules can eliminate 90% or more of your potential problems

If you do all this, chances are you're going to end up with a good computer. Notice, I did not say "best." The simple truth is that even your second or third best choice can still be more than adequate. Don't try for perfection. Try for a logical, sensible choice.

You too can be a participant in the computer revolution. You can profit by it. You can learn by it. You will certainly find it a challenge. And, perhaps most important, you can have fun doing it!


There are menaces other than plant


Then, a few minutes later, I saw the bright cloth again, this time much closer. It startled me, because I'd been walking away from it rather than toward it. And then I saw that it was a man in red, stealthily approaching, rifle in hand, looking straight at me. He was on my neighbor's property, but he was a stranger.

I decided immediately that I needed no firewood on that occasion, and began to move homeward. "Hi!" I

called cheerfully, waving wildly in what I hoped was a very human manner. The bemused hunter just stared at me a bit and then melted away; I never saw him again.

Perhaps I needed a protective companion in the woods, and when a relative's dog paid us a visit I did have a companion, for a few days anyway. Oh yes, he was a real playful companion. The first time he saw me put down an armful of wood chunks he grasped two of them in his teeth and playfully raced back into the woods with them! A day or so later he ran off to visit a female dog on the other side of the hill, was captured by that dog's owner, and had to be retrieved at the dog pound. This ended my classic, bucolic man-dog hillside relationship.

Winter weather set in with snow and bitter cold; I added a ski mask to my woodcutter's clothing gear costume. The demon stove, redoubling its efforts, steadily ate away the modest wood surplus I'd been able to accumulate on the porch. I was losing ground. My wife understandably had visions of the kitchen sink freezing over. Keeping a sizeable kindling supply was becoming a problem too. We needed a lot of it. Fires burn out, I discovered, when you work at your desk, watch TV, or read a book, obviously in a snit for your not paying attention to them. Fire-starting newspaper was burned at a record clip also, and there were times when we upended waste baskets to obtain precious kindling paper.

By mid-winter the conversion of our study to a replica of a crazed Ozark woodchopper's hut was complete. Rough boxes filled to overflowing with various sizes of firewood ranged along the wall between stove and walnut serving table, pieces of twigs and bark regularly littered the carpeted floor. Ashes too helped reduce the civilized appearance of the room. They had to be regularly taken out and dumped at the edge of the woods. Sometimes, when one tripped, ashes had a tendency to fly about the room and proved difficult to eliminate.

But the absolute nadir of the season was the time of the big smoke.

It had gradually become increas-

ingly difficult to get a good fire going without smoke backing into the room, and the fire would burn more slowly. When smoke gathered in the room, we had to open doors to clear it, thereby letting in the icy winds. It got so bad that even with the stove door tightly closed the smoke wisped out of seams in the stove piping! I glumly realized that we had a chimney problem.

When you take apart a big black pipe that sticks out into a room of your house, the procedure borders on the esoteric rather than merely mechanical. Huge globs and clouds of jet black soot have a tendency to come flying out all over the place. Go ahead, spread newspapers first, but, as you tug carefully at one pipe joint the joints two above come apart in a simultaneous burst and a violent explosion of clanging stovepipe and black soot ensues. The soot flies purposefully to every nearby surface. Try to dust it politely into a dustpan and it smears into a black slash on floor or table. In our case, we had generous amounts of soot everywhere, including on ourselves.

We finally got the room vacuumed and all the pipes cleaned and reassembled. It was not an easy job. What once has fitted need not necessarily fit again, we discovered.

Much to our dismay, the fire still would not draw properly, and we realized we had an *upper* chimney problem. We called in chimney cleaners, who immediately took apart our painstakingly assembled piping, and attacked the chimney with brushes from both ends—the roof and the wall opening. After about two hours they put everything back together and left with the cheerful news that some of their customers needed cleaning twice each winter.

The fire now burned cleanly again, but we soon discovered there were other kinds of chimney disorders.

Our basic chimney is built of concrete blocks, and stands outside the house, touching the wall. It rises about five feet above the roof of the ell in which our stove is located, and is then topped by an eight-foot extension of light stovepiping, anchored to house and ground by guy wires.

The main guy wire to the ground is the one I ran the wheelbarrow into.

Action was immediate; there was a twanging sound reminiscent of a bluegrass record being played backwards; the towering stovepipe extension teetered, swayed, and then came crashing down loudly, first onto the roof and then off down into the yard, where it sprawled, dented, in the tangle of its wires.

Crawling out a window onto the roof in a chill breeze, my wife and I attempted to put the bulky thing back in place, but only succeeded in nearly falling off the roof ourselves. Fortunately, the fire drew satisfactorily without the extension, and we were able to await our son's assistance a few weeks later.

Then the electric chain saw gave up the ghost.

I could find nothing wrong with it within the scope of my own meager knowledge of electrical appliances. and so took it to a repair shop. It would only be a day or two, they assured me, and I felt I could certainly saw stove-length logs by hand for that short period. Next day I gathered smaller branches to make it easier. but the stove gleefully burned wood of this size much faster, so that two sawings a day proved necessary.

By the end of the first "day or two"-which stretched into a weekmy shoulder was getting a bit sore and weary. "Just waiting for a part," they said as I sawed my way through a second solid week. And at some point in either the third or fourth week I confess to turning on electric baseboard heat on more than one occasion. The relative bliss of chainsawing returned after the fourth week and was thoroughly welcomed.

The final weeks of winter actually went smoothly and reasonably fast, late winter rains being the only problem. Rains are always the worst enemy-they soak every stick of wood so thoroughly that nothing you cut will burn until dried for hours or days. Some heavy March snow piled in, making boot-trudging a bit rough on the hillside, but it wasn't all bad. In deep snow there was a peaceful serenity and beauty on the hillsideand long views out into the valley that summer foliage always blocked.

Satisfied that we'd done, did we say "never again?" Not quite. Next winter we did do it again, and have done so now for four consecutive winters-each time better prepared than the year before.

Admittedly, we now order an occasional load of logs, and turn on the electric baseboard heat when the weather gets rough, but we do continue to heat by wood fire-flowers now bloom where our oil tanks used to stand.

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
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

If your obstetrician suggests routine sonograms during the course of your pregnancy, discuss the reasons before you agree. Sonograms-another name for ultrasound images-use sound wave technology to determine how the baby is developing with less risk to the mother and baby than X-rays or amniocentesis. But that doesn't mean that sonograms are perfectly safe.

To explain the different uses of ultrasound and what the possible risks might be, the Food and Drug Administration has reprinted an article from its magazine, FDA Consumer, For your free copy of The Unknowns of Ultrasound, write to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 609L, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

One of the uses of ultrasound is to determine whether or not you're pregnant, as early as the sixth or eight week. And, it lets the doctor, and you, see the position, development and condition of the fetus. A sonogram can also tell you the age of the fetus, which is critical if a Caesarean section is required for delivery. After about the 20th week of pregnancy, ultrasound can detect pronounced physical abnormalities that occur in about 3 out of every 100 births. And, if a pregnancy is high-risk, ultrasound can help keep a close watch on the mother's and baby's condition.

However, since ultrasound is a form of radiation, no one can say for sure that ultrasound is harmless, according to the Food and Drug Administration.

While there are no obvious shortterm effects on the fetus, according to a panel from the March of Dimes organization, there is concern about possible delayed reactions. The professional organization of radiologists, the American College of Radiology. suggests a conservative approach. (Continued on page 52)

They recommend that "routine ultrasound examination of the pregnant uterus not be performed, and that use of ultrasound be limited to medically indicated cases."

The booklet points out that ultrasound is of tremendous value in highrisk pregnancies, where the known benefits outweigh the theoretical risks. However, scientists and medical groups are advising reasonable caution in using ultrasound during pregnancy.

So if your doctor suggests a sonogram during the course of your pregnancy, ask why it's necessary before you agree.

Ultrasound can be helpful surgically, therapeutically and in dentistry. For example, your dentist can use an ultrasonic scaler vibrating at high speed to remove calculus from tooth surfaces. To learn some of the other uses, send for a copy of The Unknowns of Ultra-

An increasing number of health care practitioners, beauticians, and cosmetologists are claiming that they can perform facelifts using a low-powered or "cold" laser. Advertisements for laser facelifts usually claim that this is a revolutionary new method of removing wrinkles, and that it is a painless, less costly alternative to surgery. However, promoters of laser facelifts asked by the FTC to prove these claims have

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
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

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
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
